ST. URSULA ACADEMY PARLORS TO UNDERGO RENOVATIONS First Major Work in Almost 30 Years

If you are an alumna of St. Ursula Academy, how would you answer this survey question: "Name two areas/spaces on the St. Ursula campus that make St. Ursula unique and elicit fond memories?" The majority of a very small random sample said it would be the chapel and the parlors.

Recently our faithful volunteer archivists — Nancy Strottman Broermann '68, Kit Rettig Overbeck '61, Elaine Besterman Semancik '54, Janet Buchert Hirst '67, and Anne Kennealy Gutzwiller '61 — were hav-

ing lunch with several of the sisters, and mentioned that the parlors were in dire need of a "touch up." The archivists frequently host tours of the parlors and archives for docents from the Cincinnati Historical Society, the Taft Museum, the Cincinnati Art Museum, and the Museum Center, among other groups.

In addition, the parlors are still used for important activities for our students and alumnae — the annual Alumnae Christmas Tea, Homecoming, the induction ceremony for the National Honor Society and the French Honor Society, the Parents' Club Welcome Coffee, and hosting guest speakers. Many of our graduates celebrate their weddings in the chapel and take pictures in the parlors to remember their special day.

The sisters agreed to do some refurbishing. Other than cleaning, there has not been any major work done to the parlors in almost 30 years. This is an important part of our heritage, and we want to pass it on to future generations of St. Ursula Academy women. We received two very generous, unsolicited gifts to help make the ren-

ovations of the parlors possible. The first gift came from our own Elaine Besterman Semancik, and the second gift was from the Homan Foundation

in honor of Matilda Kokenge Homan '15. Matilda was one of the very first girls to enroll in St. Ursula Academy when it opened in 1910. She attended Mass in the first chapel located in what is now known as the piano parlor.

Matilda's 1915 diploma was donated by her granddaughter, Diane Homan Werner '67, and will be displayed in the parlors.

The parlors are located in the Worcester House, built in 1877 and purchased by the sisters in 1910 as our very first piece of property on McMillan Street. It is the oldest part of what is today St. Ursula Academy.

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Dear Friends,

Could anyone unfamiliar with Jorge Bergoglio prior to his 2013 election as pope and Bishop of Rome have imagined the energy he would bring to the Catholic Church — and the world community — as Pope Francis? I find it impossible to keep up!

It seems the whole of North America was electrified by Pope Francis's visits to Cuba and the United States last September. His words challenged us; his actions spoke volumes. Sr. Eileen gives us an account of her experience of the Papal Mass in Philadelphia to close the World Meeting of Families.

Through the just-ended Year of Consecrated Life, Pope Francis called women and men religious to "live passionately in the present, bearing witness to the charism of the Founders" and to "embrace the future with hope." Ursuline Sisters are responding to this call in various ways. In the past year, the leaders of North American Ursuline congregations began a contemplative process engaging the question, "What is the legacy — the spiritual heritage — the Spirit is calling us as Ursulines to offer to the People of God?"

At their fall Cluster Gathering, members, friends and co-workers of the Ursulines of Brown County, Cincinnati, Louisville and Toledo heard from their respective Ursuline schools how St. Angela's charism is being instilled in their students and staff. SUA staff member Mary Ragland represented the sisters on the planning team. The experience motivated religion teacher and participant Jenifer Mertens, a regular contributor to *National Catholic Reporter's* "Young Voices" column, to write an article about her own experience of efforts at St. Ursula to "offer the [Ursuline] charism to future generations." Recognizing the importance of the Coordinator of Ursuline Initiatives at the Academy, the sisters are supporting a new, comparable position at St. Ursula Villa. Both schools are vital transmitters of Angela's charism.

Pope Francis, from his deep well of concern for all God's creatures, has already given The church new themes to pursue. In response to the release of his encyclical, *On Care for Our Common Home: Laudato Si*, the sisters have entered a contemplative study of creation spirituality. We hope to stand open to the Spirit's guidance to practices that will bring healing to our hurting planet and hope to the disenfranchised of the world. We undertake these efforts in the light of this Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. As we move through this presidential election year, may we all do so with an eye to the well-being of all of God's people and all of creation!

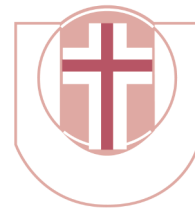

The home was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Worcester for \$36,000 and has served us well for 106 years. The representative from the flooring company that will help preserve the floors told us that the wood is from old growth forests that

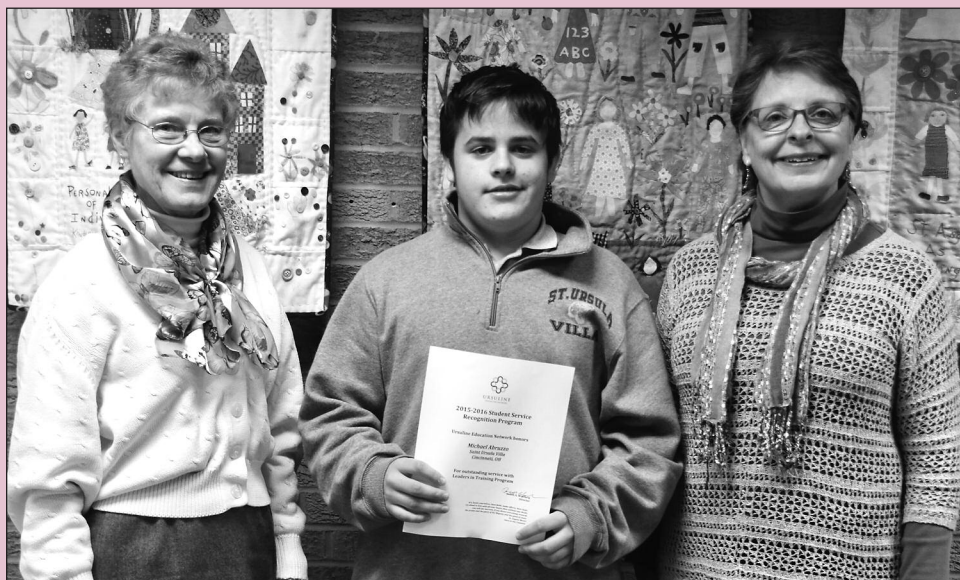
were already 600 years old when the boards were cut and installed in the house in 1877. He told us the tree species represented include oak, cherry, mahogany, and walnut.

FALL CLUSTER GATHERING

Highlighting Charism of Ursuline Schools

Mary Ragland, Coordinator of Ursuline Spirit Assistant at St. Ursula Academy, had never attended the annual Fall Cluster gathering before last year, but is now grateful she had the opportunity. Along with Theresa Butler, Director of Associates for the Louisville Ursulines, she planned the event, held Oct. 3 at General Butler State Park. Judy Wimborg, Director of the Ursuline Education Network, also assisted.

Titled "Contemplation in Action," the gathering centered on the relevance of St. Angela Merici's charism today and how it is being currently being carried out at Ursuline schools. The

day was patterned after a prayer service conducted several years ago at SUA. Representatives from four schools — SUA, Ursuline Academy in Blue Ash, Sacred Heart Academy in Louisville, and St. Ursula Academy in Toledo — were present. Liz Curran, '96, Coordinator of Ursuline Spirit Initiatives, spoke on behalf of the academy. After lunch, Jennie Mertens, '05, a religion teacher at SUA, shared a presentation on how students can be women of faith today.

The gathering came to close with a bread service, also patterned after one held at the academy, a litany and the "Hymm of St. Angela, composed

by Kathy Backherms '73.

"It was a nice, reflective day," Mary said. "It's always good to meet new people and see what they're doing. Being around others who share our love for the Ursuline charism is wonderful, and there is always more to learn about St. Angela."

"She was such a revolutionary in her time — to start a company of women, and to do it later in her life," Mary continued. "When we think we're winding down, maybe that's not the case. There might be more God wants us to do. That was definitely the case with St. Angela!"

CONCERT CELEBRATES YEAR OF CONSECRATED LIFE

Featuring Singers and Musicians from 17 Religious Orders

A full house at the Cathedral of St. Peter in Chains Jan. 17 enjoyed a concert performance by more than 120 singers and musicians from 17 religious orders, including Srs. Eileen Connelly and Margie Efke representing the Ursulines of Cincinnati. The concert celebrated the closing the Year of Consecrated Life declared by Pope Francis at the end of 2014.

Fr. Fred Link, OFM, organized the hour-long event along with a planning committee that included Sr. Eileen. More than a dozen inspirational selections, including several soloists, were featured in the program, narrated by Fr. Dan Anderson, OFM. Fr. Link conducted the choir, which was accompanied by

religious performing on piano, organ, cello, guitar, flute, trumpet and percussion instruments.

We share with you this afternoon, in reflection and song, the joy we experience in our vocation to the Consecrated Life. THE ASSIGNMENT OF A LIFETIME

Sr. Eileen Attends Papal Mass in Philadelphia



As the sun rose on Philadelphia Sept. 27, dozens of pilgrims from the Archdiocese of Cincinnati arrived on several buses that departed from the Pilarczyk Center in Dayton the night before on a faith-filled journey — to catch a glimpse of Pope Francis and take part in the Papal Mass that brought the 2015 World Meeting of Families to close. Their trip was sponsored by the archdiocesan Family and Respect Life Office. The buses traveled through the night to “the city of brotherly love,” leaving the pilgrims exhausted, but excited about the day’s events.

Among the travelers was Sr. Eileen Connelly, who was covering the trip for *The Catholic Telegraph*, where she serves as news editor. “An assignment like that is a blessing,” said Sr. Eileen, “and the experience of a lifetime.”

Joining throngs of other pilgrims, Sr. Eileen’s group made their way through the crowded streets of

Philadelphia and security checkpoints before securing vantage points along Ben Franklin Parkway where they eagerly awaited the Holy Father’s arrival. While they waited, the pilgrims prayed, laughed, chatted and shopped for souvenirs, including rosaries and other commemorative items. Jumbotrons throughout the city enabled them to keep track of the pope’s every move. When Pope Francis appeared in the “Popemobile,” he was greeted with cheers and shouts of excitement as he smiled and waved to the faithful crowd.

The atmosphere became one of prayer and reverence as the 4 p.m. Mass began. The diverse crowd of pilgrims, representing various nationalities and age groups, joined together in worship, led by their beloved pontiff, who spoke of the importance of family and treating one another with kindness during his homily. At Communion, they sang together the familiar words of “You Satisfy a Hungry Heart” and “Taste and See.”

“I was moved by the pope’s message of hope and the joyfulness of those gathered,” said Sr. Eileen. “It was a truly Spirit-filled experience to be in the holy, yet humble, presence of Pope Francis and share such an incredible sense of faith and community with more than a million other people.”
